



Proposed Shively Park Disc Golf Course

What is Disc Golf?

- Similar to traditional golf - with simpler equipment
- No carts - game is played in natural and less-refined spaces
- 203 courses in Oregon
- Common in public parks & multi-use sites
- Low barrier - cheap implements & low fees (or free!)



Development Process

- Public expressed desire for disc golf
- Parks Master Plan 2026-2036: explore disc golf amenities
- Staff determined Evergreen/Shively viable after investigating alternate locations (Alderbrook Lagoon, Cathedral Tree Trail, Tapiola)
- Presented to Parks Advisory Board
- Feedback obtained from local disc golfers on proposed layout



Nearby Course Comparisons & Use Data (June 2026):

- Columbia Shore Disc Golf Course @ Fort Stevens State Park:
23 Holes
UDisc: 735 rounds played **274 U = ~10 Players/Day**
\$10/Day Parking Fee (\$12 non-resident) or State Parks Annual Pass
- Lucky Mud Disc Golf Course @ Skamokawa, WA:
21 Holes
UDisc: 123 rounds played, 77 unique players
\$10/Day
- Skyline Disc Golf Course @ Cathlamet, WA:
18 Holes
UDisc: 74 rounds played, 58 unique players
\$10/Round

Why Shively Park?

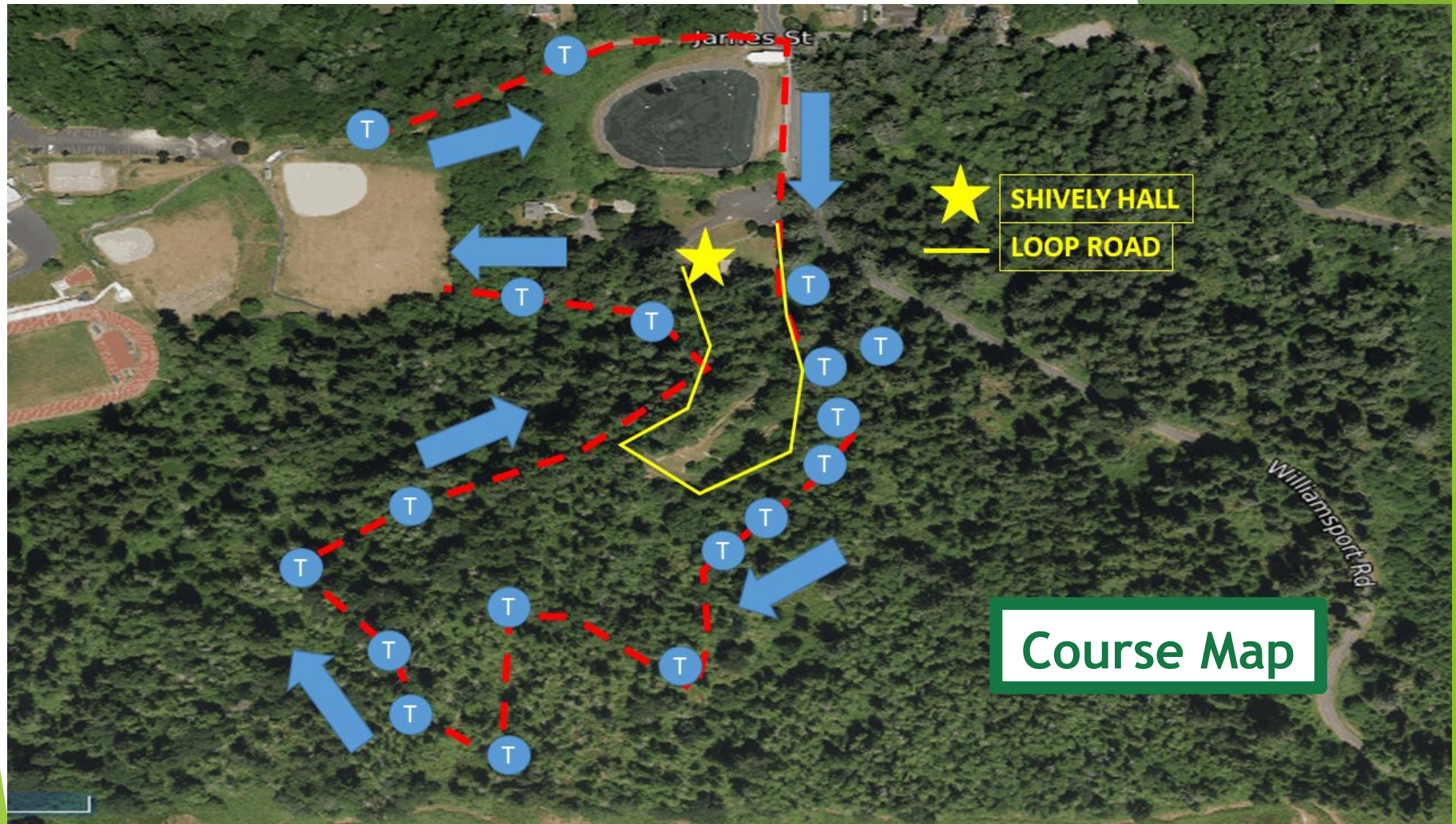
- Capacity in undeveloped areas
- Complex wooded terrain
- Minimal infrastructure required
- Ability to limit conflict with existing uses
- Available parking & restrooms @ Evergreen



Proposed Course

- City-owned property around Evergreen Fields and the exterior of Shively Park
- 18 hole course
- Starts & ends at Evergreen Fields
- Final layout still being developed

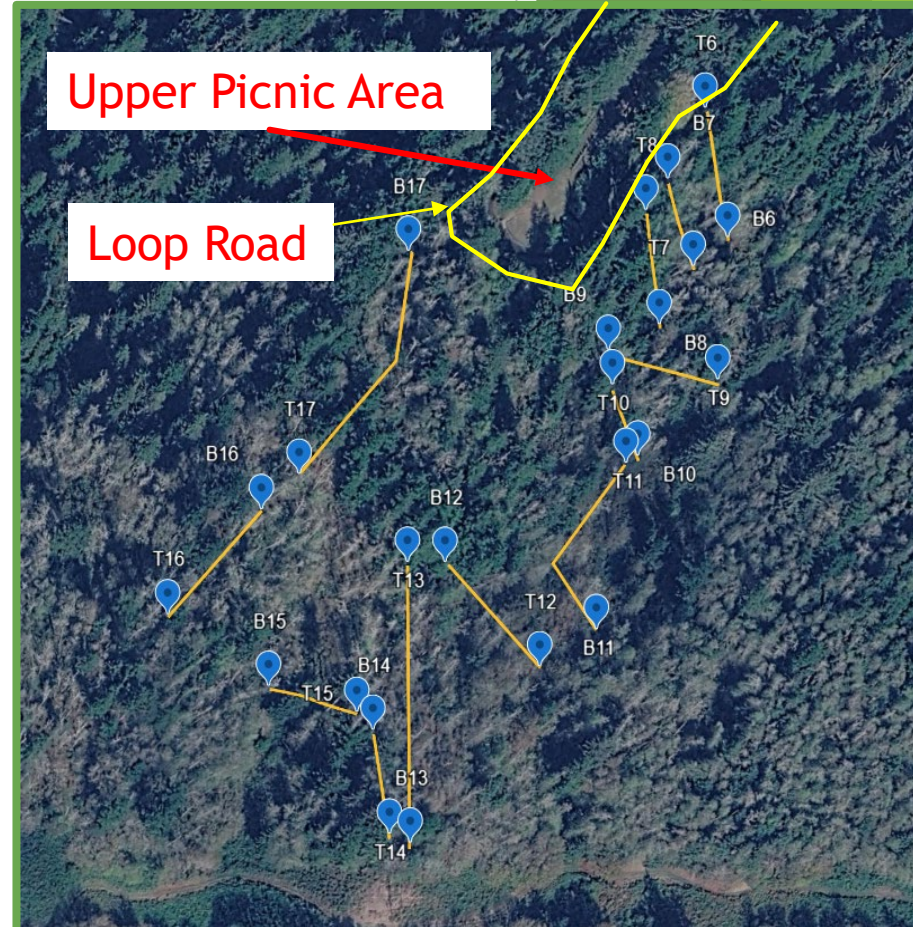
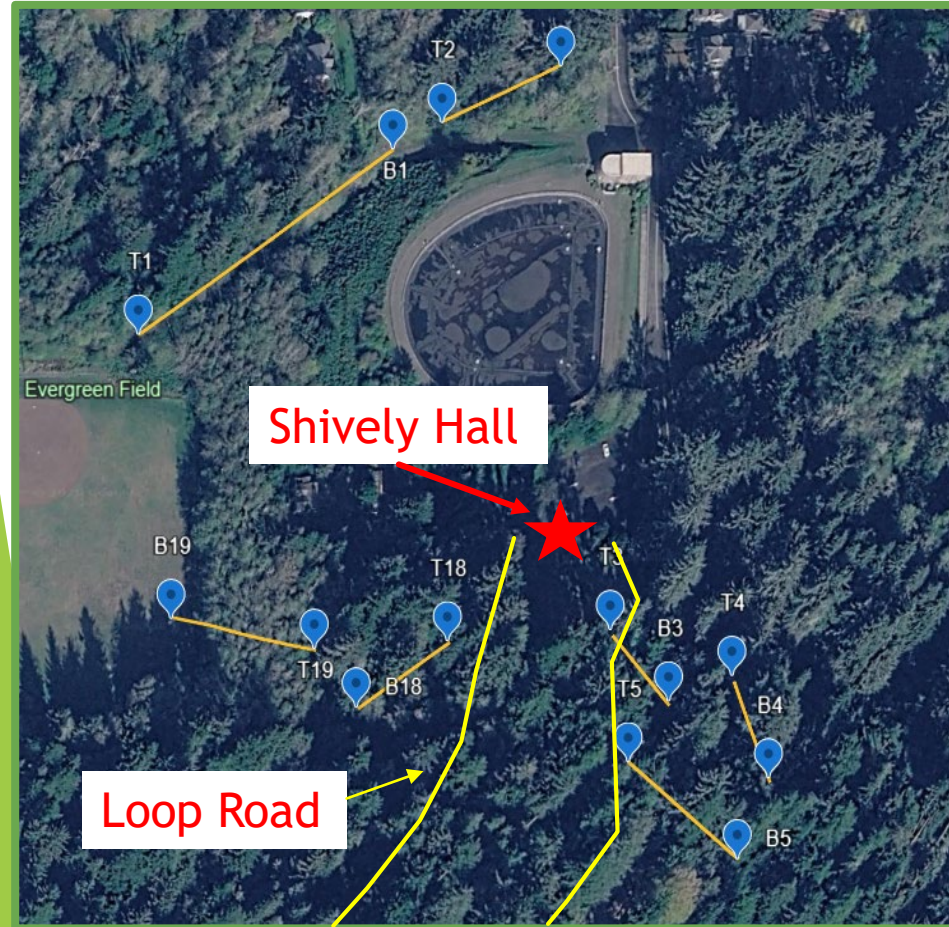

Tees & Baskets Maps

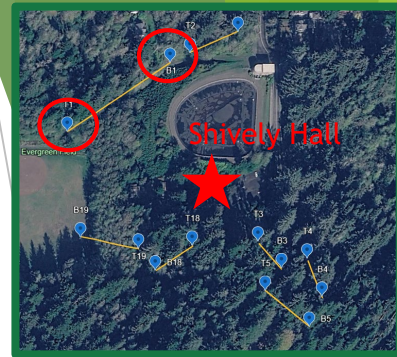

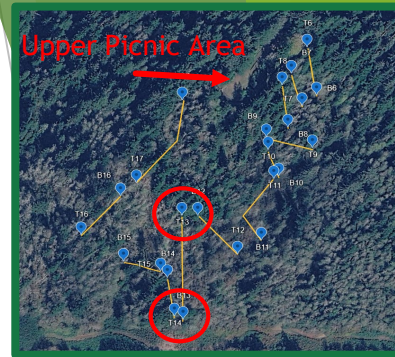
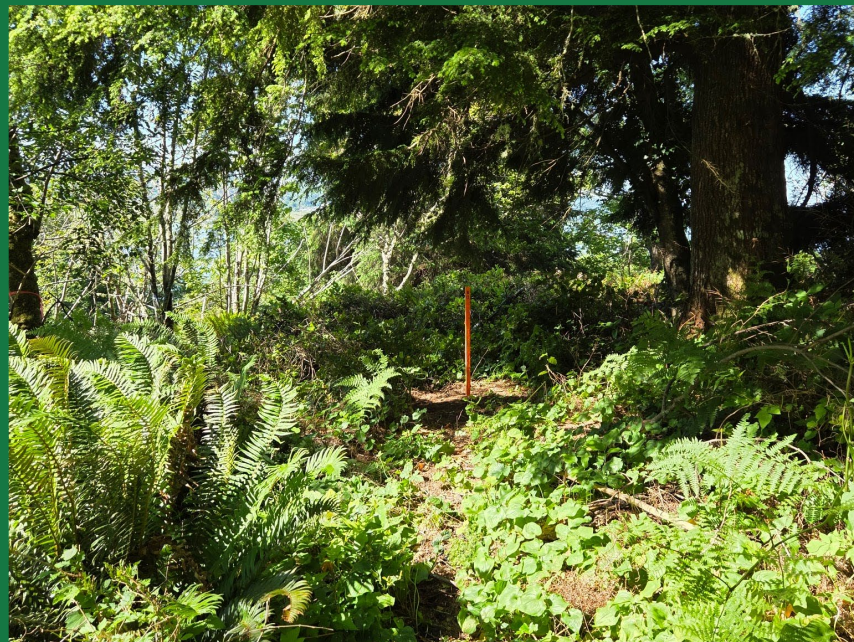


HOLE 13

Feedback & Concerns:

1. Preserving Shively's quiet character
2. Disc golfer/pedestrian safety
3. Parking capacity & traffic
4. Ongoing maintenance
5. Impacts to historic elements/infrastructure



Responses to Concerns

1. Preserving Shively's quiet character -

~90% of course occurs in areas of the park currently not used or accessed by the public.

Minimal overlap with routine park use is anticipated and design changes can be made based on conflicts or concerns.



Responses to Concerns

2. Disc golfer/pedestrian safety -

Design consideration has been taken to reduce potential accidents.

Tee pads near use areas are oriented to prevent issues & sight lines are open to allow disc golfers to see approaching park users.

Signs will be prominently posted with safety reminders.



Responses to Concerns

3. Parking capacity & traffic -

Parking available at Evergreen Fields - course begins/ends there.

Shively Hall & Park hosts multiple large events and no adverse traffic incidents have been reported.

Parks After-school program & multiple camps have been hosted at Shively.



Responses to Concerns

4. Ongoing Maintenance -

Primary ongoing maintenance task is clearing limbs/debris from paths.

Staff estimate that the course will require approximately two labor-hours per week.

Volunteers may offset maintenance demands.



Responses to Concerns

5. Impacts to historic elements -

Course avoids built infrastructure. No historic elements will be disturbed and no designated-historic sites will be altered.

The course can provide an opportunity to increase awareness of historic elements at the park.
